t was great to see so many people at our September group meeting for the talk by Richard Hindley – lead urology consultant from Basingstoke Hospital. We had over 40 people including some first-timers, the most at a group meeting since Covid and the return to face-to-face meetings.

This was the first time we have used all our new audio-video kit, funded by the Loddon Lilies, for a meeting with others joining over Zoom, and despite a few initial technical gremlins, it all went well in the end.

The national charity, **Tackle Prostate Cancer** have re-started their occasional newsletter, *Prostate Matters* and the latest edition features the NHPCSG with an interview with Allan our secretary. 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September Meeting

hat a privilege to have Prof Richard Hindley, one of Britain's leading urologists, based here in our local hospital trust, as our key speaker this month. In an urgent message the previous evening it was explained that he would not be able to attend in person, due to added workload and staff shortages. This gave the Group its first chance to put into operation our new Zoom screen system, which it has recently purchased following the kindness of the Loddon Lilies, a ladies' group from Sherfield on Loddon who



have chosen to actively fund-raise on our behalf this year. Once operational the system worked particularly well.

Throughout Richard's talk it became very clear that we are particularly well served locally. As the Trust is one of the leading innovation and treatment centres in the UK, with some of its work having worldwide implications in terms of treatments. Basingstoke continues to punch well above its weight in terms of innovation, and also in undertaking trials of new treatments. Currently it has been selected along with Oxford and Imperial College to perform UK trials of a new steam treatment system which has shown promise in the US. Building on the earlier excellent results of the Promis trial that introduced mp-MRI scans nationally, work is now ongoing to refine these scans potentially leading to them being used in a mass screening programme for prostate cancer.

Another example of Basingstoke's lead in the treatment of prostate cancer; after University College Hospital in London, Basingstoke was only the second location in the UK to use HIFU (High intensity focussed ultra sound) commencing just two years behind in 2006. Richard explained that HIFU is recognised as being less damaging to peripheral tissue leading to reduced side effects especially in potential sexual function. Whilst no trial has been formally run, early indications suggest that over the last 7 to 8 years the outcomes between radiotherapy and HIFU show no significant difference. It has also been remarkably effective in men with a main tumour and smaller additional tumours with just the main one being treated, regularly leading to the impact of the minor tumours diminishing.

Right from the start, Richard emphasised the importance of PSA testing, indicating that this form of testing has radically improved in accuracy and value over recent years. In his view a screening programme will be implemented before too long. He added that in future MRI screening is ultimately likely to become in the key marker, with the added benefits of identifying the exact size and location of any suspect tumours, enabling accurate targeted biopsies and better assessment of various treatment options.

Following a round of questions to Richard from the floor, there was a very genuine expression of appreciation given to him for giving up time from the operating theatre. Without the support of the Loddon Lilies, this Zoom meeting, which worked so well, would never have been possible.

With prostate cancer now the most prevalent cancer in the UK, it is disturbing to realise that in 2020 the number being diagnosed was about 25% of previous years, with 2021 still only about one third; even this year the level has risen to about 50% of earlier times This clearly suggests that there are many cases existing yet to be diagnosed, but worryingly with probably much more advanced disease and thus poorer prognosis.

It was encouraging to have a number of members join us for the first time, and it was encouraging, in the light of the support given them, to hear that they want to participate at future events.
